# Public Safety Report

**Bonney Lake Police Department**

**January 2025**

**PATROL ACTIVITY***January 5th—January 12th*

**Armed Robbery/Aslt 2nd/Kidnapping/MVTR at 6XXX W. Tapps Hwy E** – Originally came in as a welfare check of a male that was bleeding from his face. Victim is a Locksmith and was requested on Facebook Messenger for a job in the 6400 block of W. Tapps Hwy E. When he arrived, three individuals appeared on foot, telling him their vehicle was around the corner and requested a ride from him to the vehicle. Once in the vehicle, suspects produced firearms and one pistol whipped the victim in the face. Suspects took the victims cell phone and wallet. They moved the victim to a passenger seat and drove his vehicle. At the red light, victim was able to flee from the vehicle. Detectives held over and took over the investigation.

**Missing Person at 9XXX 210<sup>th</sup> Ave E** – Caller reported her mother with dementia had walked away from the residence with her dog and can't locate her. While Officers were searching the area, a welfare check call came in at Papa Murphy's for an elderly female. It was found to be the caller's mother, and she responded to Papa Murphy's to pick her up.

**Warrant Arrest at Fred Meyer** – Officers observed a suspicious vehicle with no license plates in the parking lot that was occupied by three subjects. Officers observed drug paraphernalia on the lap of the rear passenger, who advised having a warrant for his arrest out of Yelm. He was found to also have two warrants out of Puyallup. He was taken into custody and booked into jail.

*January 12th—January 19th*

**Shoplift at Walmart**—Loss Prevention from Walmart called to advise a known shoplifter was inside the store. It was learned the shoplifter was currently under investigation for seven other shoplifts in the past few months. The female shoplifted again this evening and was taken into custody by officers as she exited the store. Due to staffing levels, the female was released from police custody and trespassed from the store by Walmart.

**Person With Weapon at Fred Meyer**—Manager reported an unwanted subject in the store with a rifle or stick. Officers arrived and contacted the subject outside, who had an axe on his person. The subject was moved along per manager's request.

**Hit and Run at 19XXX South Prairie Rd E** – Caller advised a hit and run had occurred on SR 410 E near Target. Caller followed the suspect vehicle into the Lowes parking lot, where the suspect driver yelled at the reporting party and fled west bound on SR 410 E. Officers located the suspect vehicle at Walmart and conducted a traffic stop. The driver was taken into custody for hit and run attended and booked into jail.

**PATROL ACTIVITY Cont.***January 19th—January 26th*

**Reckless/Eluding at SR 410 E @ 214<sup>th</sup> Ave E**—Citizen reported two subjects on motorcycles driving recklessly west bound from 214<sup>th</sup>. An officer happened to see the two pass by and attempted a traffic stop at 192<sup>nd</sup> Ave E. Both subjects fled and PC for Eluding was established. The two subjects were then observed trying to use the walking path behind the Premier Storage to escape. Other Officers arrived to assist and after an extensive game of cat and mouse via wooded trails, public roadways and walking paths, with no pursuit needed as the motorcycles were small and slow, the two subjects were ultimately apprehended on a trail in the Tehaleh neighborhood via Falling Waters after fleeing the City. Both subjects were identified as juveniles and subsequently booked into Remann Hall.

**Reckless Driving at SR 410 E**—Officer observed a vehicle driving recklessly while commuting to his shift. The vehicle started on SR 167 and merged onto SR 410 E, traveling at a high rate of speed, tailgating, and quickly changing lanes without signaling. A traffic stop was conducted, and the driver was a 17-year-old male who stated he was trying to get home. The subject was cited and released to his parents upon their arrival.

**Abandoned Vehicle at Snag Island**—PCSD requested Officers knock on the RO's door to ask if they knew the location of their vehicle. Officers attempted contact with no answer. Officers later located the RO at the Bonney Lake Emergency Room and learned her son had been involved in a collision. PCSD arrived on scene and was provided with this information.

*January 26th—February 2nd*

**Suspicious Vehicles at Lowes**— Officers made contact with a motorhome and a truck pulling a RV trailer. The subjects advised they had been given permission from the manager to be there. One of the subjects is a former Lowes employee. All subjects were advised that we would be following up with Lowes the following day and they may be requested to move along.

**Suicidal/Invol at 4XXX North Island Dr E**—Juvenile reportedly cut arms with glass. Brother was caller and mom was trying to render aid. Juvenile was attempting to leave prior to Officers arriving but was unable to. Officers arrived and determined injuries to be superficial, and EPF&R arrived to take care of the wounds. Juvenile was ultimately involuntarily committed without further incident.

**Motor Vehicle Collision at Thian Thai**—Reports of a vehicle that crashed into the embankment in the parking lot from Veterans Memorial Dr E. The subject had a medical issue while driving and was transported to the hospital.

In order to prioritize cases submitted to the City’s Code Enforcement Team the City has established a Code Enforcement Prioritization Matrix as authorized in BLMC 14.130.040.G. This matrix assigns cases to four different levels and priorities based on the severity of the violation and its impact on public health, safety, and welfare.

### Civil Penalties and Settlement Agreements

The City collected \$3,000.00 from civil penalties and settlement agreements between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025. All other revenue in this time period (\$4,095.50) was for Voluntary Correction Agreements.

There is currently \$117,000 in outstanding civil penalties. Civil penalties may be waived or reduced in certain circumstances.

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<sup>1</sup> Case priority is assigned based on the initial Request for Action. Cases are closed based on the results of the investigation. When the investigation determines that the issue is a civil matter (between two private parties), the case is closed.

The City dismissed \$11,100 in civil penalties for property owners who corrected their violations between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025.

The mission of the Emergency Management Division is to protect the Bonney Lake community by administering a comprehensive emergency management program which coordinates and integrates all activities necessary to build, sustain, and improve the City's capability to mitigate against, prepare for, respond to, and recover from threatened or actual emergencies and/or disasters, be they natural or human caused.

In partnership with the Bonney Lake Emergency Management Committee (EMC) and the East Pierce Interlocal Coalition for Emergency Management (EPIC-EM), the following initiatives were determined as priority for the 2025 year:

# OPERATIONAL READINESS

## **Training and Exercise**

- Conducted two COOP/COG exercises with Management Team
- Hosted regional ICS300, ICS400, and G191 EOC/ICS Interface courses

## **Preparedness**

- Annual MRE purchase completed, including additional order of gluten free MREs
- Director kits procured and assembled

## **Damage Assessment Teams**

- Identified 3 Public Services Damage Assessment Teams for inspection of critical facilities
- Procured and assembled equipment and supply kits for each team
- One Operational team to be established for assessment of critical infrastructure



# ALERT & WARNING

## **Public Alert & Warning**

- EPIC jurisdictions, including Bonney Lake, are migrating from CodeRED to Genasys as an alert and warning platform. Tacoma has already made the switch, and the West Pierce Coalition is in the planning phase.
- Bonney Lake has successfully migrated and has gone LIVE.
- Successful internal testing conducted during December 2025 flooding event.

## **Communications Plan**

- City Communications Plan in draft form; joint planning with Executive, Administrative Services, Police, and Public Services Departments at this time



# REGIONAL SCHOOL SAFETY AND REUNIFICATION

## **Standard Response Protocols**

- Sumner Bonney Lake School District and EPIC have led planning efforts for the other school districts in the EPIC area to develop consistent protocols across the districts.
- Districts across Pierce County now looking at following the example set in our districts.

## **What do Do to Get to 72**

- Phase 2 planning approach: how do the schools meet the needs of students, faculty, and staff for up to 72 hours.
- Reunification Kits: EPIC utilized grant funds to build reunification kits to be staged around the EPIC area and used at reunification sites. Bonney Lake has one of these kits.

## **Exercise:**

- East Pierce Lahar Evacuation Exercise—April 23, 2026



# PUBLIC EDUCATION & OUTREACH

## **Situational Awareness Campaign**

- The purpose is to be able to share critical information with the public in public spaces during or leading up to an emergency incident.
- Procurement and installation of televisions at Justice & Municipal Center and Public Service Center—currently testing broadcasting systems; PD TV to be reinstalled after renovations

## **Public Education**

- Emergency Preparedness for Seniors and Winter Weather Safety presentations at Senior Center.

## **Outreach**

- Initial investment into outreach materials for the community, including equipment (tables, tablecloths, canopies, etc.) and supplies (brochure holders, give aways, interactive activities, etc.).
